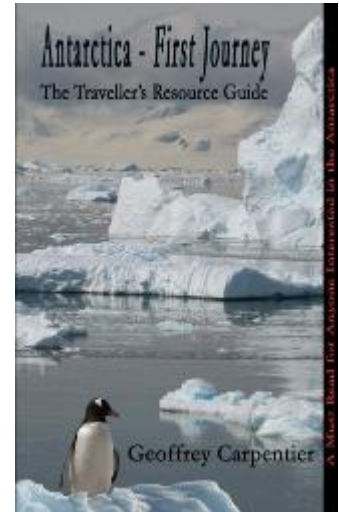


Introducing **Antarctica - First Journey** A New Book about Antarctic Travel

Scope and content of the book

Many books about Antarctica that focus on the visiting traveler are out of date and incomplete. I am an expedition guide who has been traveling to Antarctica for five years as a lecturer and naturalist. Throughout my journeys I have met thousands of visitors with myriad questions. What I have learned is that they want to know everything and anything about Antarctica, but I also came to understand that no good resource was available to them. I decided to take what I knew, draw on the experience of myself and others and produce a concise, current book that would help them in planning and implementing their journey. The result was a 360-page full colour book that covered the most widely visited areas – Ushuaia, the Falklands (Malvinas), South Georgia, South Orkneys, South Shetlands, South Sandwich Islands and the Peninsula.



Essentially everything a traveler would want to know is discussed, including:

- Planning the trip – choosing a ship, travel style, company; packing, what one can expect regarding activities and travel tips;
- Medical - a doctor, who has worked as a ship's physician, helped me research this chapter that deals with common travel, seagoing, shore-based and weather-related concerns and offers traditional medicinal and homeopathic remedies;
- A primer on ice, snow, weather and climate;
- Tourism controls and rules – IAATO, biosecurity, proximity to wildlife, environmental protection, Antarctic Treaty and related protocols;
- Wildlife – detailed information on birds, mammals (land & oceanic), plants, invertebrates and fish;
- A detailed chapter on over 200 sites one might visit while down there, including information on terrain, history, wildlife and landing conditions; an introduction to islands that don't exist (based on research by Dr. Bob Headland) enhances the completeness of the book;
- A chronological summary of significant historical accomplishments and milestones from 1616 to present; and
- A compilation of marine superstitions that promises to entertain and educate.
